
# Discipline Reform: Alternative Strategies to Exclusionary Discipline Practices

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
### Problem:

Researchers find that exclusionary discipline leads to minimal behavior change and negative student outcomes.




## Purpose:

# Alternative Strategies to Exclusionary Discipline

### Tier 1

- -Bullying Prevention and Intervention
- -Reinforcement
- -Peer Mediation
- -School Climate
- -Sleep and School
- -Social Skills
- -And more...

### Tier 2

- -Anger Management
- -Behavior Monitoring
- -Check-In/Check-Out
- -Conflict De-escalation
- -Mentoring
- -Restitution
- -Truancy Reduction
- -And more...

#### Tier 3

- -Academic Supports & Tutoring
- -Behavior Contracting
- -Discipline Recovery
- -Family Group Conferencing -Wraparound
- -And more...
